An Overview of Revitalization

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Defining Church Revitalization

Church revitalization is a <u>movement</u> within the greater evangelical church which emphasizes the <u>missional</u> work of turning a <u>plateaued</u> or <u>rapidly</u> <u>declining</u> church and moving it back toward <u>health</u>, <u>vitality</u>, and <u>growth</u>.

I. The Phases of Church Revitalization - Blueprint

Refocusing – For a church that is growing but needs to set new challenges and look for opportunities to expand their Gospel witness in their target area.

Revisioning – For a church that was once alive and vital but is on the verge of losing its focus and drive for the mission of Jesus.

Renewal – For a church that needs to get back on track. It needs a spiritual jump start.

I. The Phases of Church Revitalization - Blueprint

Reinvention – For a church that needs new tools and techniques to help it adapt to a changing community or to a general societal shift. New experiences must replace old experiences. New practices must replace old practices.

<u>Restoration</u> – For a church that needs a fresh understanding of the new future, it must meet needs in order to give it a restored place in the community.

<u>Resurrection</u> – For a church that must face the challenge that it has waited too long to enter into revitalization. This church has been flat-lined and hanging on by means of its legacy and the faithful few who are attending.

Revitalization is a <u>necessary</u> and important aspect of the life of a church.

Every church will need seasons of intentional revitalization if it is to maintain spiritual vitality, freshness, and missional effectiveness.

The impact of the <u>decision</u> a church and its leadership make regarding revitalization will impact future generations.

II. The Priority of Revitalization - Biblical

Church revitalization is an apostolic priority.

The Acts of the Apostles emphasizes the expansion of the Gospel throughout the Roman Empire (and beyond) through <u>church</u> <u>planting</u>.

II. The Priority of Revitalization - Biblical

The Epistles emphasized church health and church revitalization.

- 1. They are <u>visionary</u>.
- 2. They skillfully instill a sense of <u>urgency</u>.
- 3. They are willing to take <u>risks</u>.

Ten Characteristics of Effective Revitalization Pastors...

- 4. They lean into conflict.
- 5. They <u>persevere</u>.
- 6. They accept <u>responsibility</u>.

Ten Characteristics of Effective Revitalization Pastors...

- 7. They lead the church to celebrate "wins."
- 8. They demonstrate dependence on God.
- 9. They are <u>life-time learners</u>.
- 10. They are confidently <u>humble</u>.
